Students will explore theories and concepts about bio-physical, socio-emotional, and cognitive developmental milestones from conception through adolescence; individual and cultural differences; and common variations in development. Students will develop critical thinking, writing, and oral presentation skills in preparation to work with children and families.

HOW DO I GET STARTED?

- ⇒ Visit the **CAREER CENTER** to learn about opportunities in the field and help determining if it is a good fit for your preferred values, strengths, skills, and interests. CSS 2nd floor.
- ⇒ Attend annual **TRANSFER FAIR** and **TRANSFER CENTER WORKSHOPS** to determine which university is the best fit for you as well as application requirements and transfer process.
- ⇒ JOB SHADOW and NETWORK WITH PROFESSIONALS in positions you wish to obtain.
- ⇒ Participate in campus clubs to gain **TEAMWORK** and **LEADERSHIP** skills.
- ⇒ Learn AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE and other foreign languages.
- ⇒ Gain experience by VOLUNTEERING or getting a SUMMER JOB at a camp, daycare centers, or tutoring center.
- ⇒ Obtain CPR and FIRST AID CERTIFICATIONS.
- ⇒ Join **PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATIONS** such as the National Association for the Education of Young Children or the National Council on Family Relations to network and maintain current knowledge of opportunities in the field.

WHAT SKILLS DO I NEED?

- ⇒ **Self-reflection** monitoring/Assessing performance of yourself, other individuals, or organizations to make improvements or take corrective action.
- \Rightarrow **Service Orientation** actively looking for ways to help people.
- ⇒ **Social Perceptiveness** being aware of others' reactions and understanding why they react as they do.
- ⇒ **Active Listening** giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate times.
- \Rightarrow **Coordination** adjusting actions in relation to others' actions.

PREFERRED WORK STYLES INCLUDE:

- ⇒ **Self Control** maintain composure, keeping emotions in check, controlling anger, and avoiding aggressive behavior, even in very difficult situations.
- ⇒ Concern for Others being sensitive to others' needs and feelings and being understanding and helpful on the job.
- \Rightarrow **Integrity** being honest and ethical.
- ⇒ Stress Tolerance accepting criticism and dealing calmly and effectively with high stress situations
- ⇒ **Cooperation** being pleasant with others on the job and displaying a good-natured, cooperative attitude.
