### Strategic Goal 1: Increase Student Achievement and Success

Completion Initiative and Guided Pathways

- Mark your calendar! The <u>Completion Initiative</u> workgroup meets the first Tuesday of each month from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. in ST 107. Fall 2018 meetings—open to all!—will be September 4, October 2, November 6, and December 4. Everyone is encouraged to participate in one or more of the meetings.
- At its September 4 meeting, the Completion Initiative workgroup discussed onboarding. - A team of seven from Norco College is attending the fourth of six California Guided Pathways institutes, September 6-8 in San Francisco. The focus of this institute is strengthening the onboarding process and ongoing student support for students.
- Three faculty from Norco College will be attending the Academic Senate of California Community College's Academic Academy September 14-15 in San Francisco: Dr. Courtney Buchanan, assistant professor of anthropology; Lisa Martin, assistant professor of counseling; and Jethro Midgett, assistant professor of counseling. The event is titled <u>Navigating New Frontiers: Faculty Leadership in Guided Pathways</u>.

Athletics Plan

• Student Life is working on a comprehensive proposal for expansion of athletics, which is being revised with ideas from last year's discussions into a more detailed, long-range plan. The proposal will be presented for approval through the shared governance process this academic year.

Creating Student, Classroom, and Faculty Spaces

• The Wilfred J. Airey Library now has a station for students to charge their electronic devices while studying or utilizing the library's services and resources. The charging station, which is free for students, has fifteen bays and allows a user to set his or her own PIN code. Student Equity

- A professional development opportunity for faculty! ### Strategic Goal 3: Increase Student Access


Call Center

During Callapooloza, which took place from 4:00 to 9:00 p.m. the week before fall semester, faculty, managers, and staff called 7,780 students who had not yet enrolled or had enrolled in fewer than seven units. Following the call center efforts, at the start of the term 2,665 of those students were enrolled in courses totaling 3,995 additional units generated, or 133 FTES, generating \$679,497 for the District. Fall 2018 marks the second time for the presemester call center, resulting in an even more efficient process this term.

Although many factors influence how many students come to Norco College, annual headcount is one of the measures we use to gauge institutional effectiveness. The chart below shows the annual headcount for the College over the past eight years. As an initial observation, one can see that earlier in this decade, there was a three-year drop in attendance. The past five years have shown steady but slow increases in students attending Norco College, until the past two years, which have shown much steeper increases in student headcount numbers. We have been used to saying that the College enrolls about 13,000 students per year, but now we will need to get used to saying we enroll about 15,000 students per year. If these headcount numbers continue to increase, Norco College will need to start planning how it will maintain the quality it had as a "smaller institution" while enjoying the benefits of being a growing college.



### Early Registration

• Combined registration for two upcoming terms, winter and spring 2019, is expected to take place this fall for all three colleges in the District. It is expected that about 3,000 students districtwide will be utlizing EduNav, an academic planning and registration tool, to register for winter and spring.

**Enrollment Management** 

• As of week 2 of the semester, the College has hit its enrollment target of 3220 FTES for fall 2018 and may exceed that target with further enrollment in specific programs, such as Next Phase. Dr. Samuel Lee, vice president of Academic Affairs, notes that every enrollment is important at this stage of the game and points to the goal of maximizing students' access and opportunity. He identifies as crucial the faculty's hard work in adding and retaining students, as instructors deem appropriate for the course cap and pedagogical integrity—especially with the census date approaching on Monday, September 10.

High School Partnership Program

• This fall, the College is rolling out one or more courses at each of six area high schools. Registration for dual enrollment appears on the daily enrollment report sent to nor-all by Dr. Jason Parks, dean of instruction.

Veterans Education/Promise Program

- The articulation platform to identify credit for military training and experience is continuing development, and outreach to veterans is continuing.
- Dr. Michael Collins, vice president of Business Services, met with architects for the Veterans Resource Center on August 30 to look at options for the site of the new building.
- **Hey, look!** As of Wednesday, September 5, for the fall 2018 semester, **419** veterans have enrolled at Norco College, either utilizing benefits or self-identified as veterans, compared with 367 in fall 2017.

# Strategic Goal 4: Create Effective Community Partnerships

• The Energy, Construction, and Utilities (ECU) Regional Advisory and Industry Skills panel meets September 21 at the Ontario Carpenters Training Center. The event brings together regional colleges within and outside of our District to solicit input from business professionals to address the changing needs of industry.

- Dr. Bryan Reece, Norco College president, and Dr. Kevin Fleming, strategic development, will be traveling to Washington, D.C. the end of September along with members of the Corona Chamber of Commerce on a legislative advocacy visit. Among the approximately one dozen planned visits will be meetings with the Office of Veterans Affairs, members of Congress, and the National Science Foundation.
- The City of Corona plans to open a new Corona Innovation Center this fall, and Norco College is meeting with the city to discuss a presence in that space.

National Photonics Research Center

• Dr. Wolde-Ab Isaac, chancellor of Riverside Community College District, and the Board of Trustees held a public form on Norco College's proposed photonics project in Corona on September 5, led by Trustees Janet Green and Bill Hedrick. The Board of Trustees will discuss this forum at its next regular meeting on September 17.

Accreditation Preparation

• A "drafty draft" of Accreditation 2020 institutional self-evaluation report (ISER) front matter and Standards Committees work so far was presented at faculty FLEX days, along with an overview of the timeline and key parts of the ISER document. As part of the presentation, Dr. Lee, the College's accreditation liaison officer, led attendees in an activity to consider evidence that shows the College's alignment with Standard IIA: Instructional Programs.

Faculty will be involved in the selection process for student ambassadors, with the goal of having the ambassadors in place by the end of September.

Prioritization (Supplies and Equipment, Staff, Technology, Facilities)

- The Institutional Strategic Planning Council (ISPC) will be establishing a workgroup to review the College prioritization process.
- The Academic Affairs prioritization subcommittee will meet in late September (meeting date TBA) to prioritize program review requests for instructional resources.

Resource Development

• At its September 5 meeting, ISPC discussed a proposed new indirect-cost reinvestment procedure, which would establish a college indirect rate for non-general fund appropriations and some private gifts of up to ten percent. (Indirect costs are costs not specifically designated but included within many grants, gifts, and non-general fund legislative appropriations for what might be called "overhead.") The proposal reinvests fifty percent of

indirect revenue into the Strategic Development unit and fifty percent into College operations.

Safety

- The College's safety team offered disaster worker training focusing on CPR, use of an automated external defibrillator (AED), and first aid in June and August.
- With the support of Facilities, College Safety and Police, the vice president of Academic Affairs, and the Professional Development Committee, Safety and Emergency Planning participated in the fall 2018 FLEX Days. Included was active shooter training, utilizing three scenarios that participants rotated through (classroom, open space/collaborative, and office environment). In addition, Safety and Emergency Planning was invited to present a disaster preparedness module at the fall 2018 FLEX Days.
- The Safety Committee, College Police, and Safety and Emergency Planning participated in Welcome Day and Welcome Week 2018.

- The safety team is promoting community emergency response team (CERT) training, hosted at Moreno Valley College on October 19 and 26.

Scheduled Maintenance Planning

• Parking lot B, bordered by Third Street, Mustang Circle, College Way, and Windy Way, is likely to be resealed and restriped during Thanksgiving break.

Strategic Planning

• The College Strategic Plan and Facilities Master Plan are under development in tandem with the Educational Master Plan (EMP). Nine meetings with College divisions, Schools, and other groups are being planned to discuss development of the EMP, beginning with the college leadership retreat on September 28.

Traffic and Parking

- For traffic flow and safety, pylons have been set up on Third Street at Kennedy Lane (between the STEM Center and JFK Middle College High School) to prevent cars from making U-turns at this location and from making left turns into or out from the STEM parking lot. After two to three weeks, the College will evaluate the change to see if it is making a positive difference. - The HAWK system (High intensity Activated crossWalK), installed in early spring 2018, appears to be helping with traffic flow.
- Fifty more staff/faculty parking spaces were added in various lots on campus before the beginning of the fall semester. The College will be assessing the availability of parking based on daily counts supplied by College Safety and Police as well as discussions with faculty, staff, and students. All decisions regarding parking will continue to be rooted in data.
- Norco College is working with the public works director for the City of Norco to evaluate timing of the left-turn light from Hamner Avenue onto Third Street. The time was increased at the College's request, which has improved the flow of traffic onto the campus. Hamner Avenue is scheduled to be repaved in October, at which time the sensing loops in the left-

turn lane, which are currently disconnected, will be reconnected and calibrated for optimal turn timing.

Website

- Training will take place September 20, 21, 25, and 26 to enable individual units and departments of the College to update their websites/webpages within the College website.
- The College is working on a redesigned, more student-friendly website that uses a Guided Pathways and Schools orientation. The new site will migrate over most content from the current website.
