2024 Objective 7.4: Develop and implement plan for expanded athletics offerings



• Men's rugby at Norco College is underway, and women's rugby is ramping up to follow suit. The club started practicing on September 23 and participated in its first 7s Tournament at Claremont McKenna College on October 12. The club team competed in the tournament against teams such as the University of Southern California, Arizona State University, and Point Loma University. In the first game, Norco College players soundly defeated Cal State Fullerton, 25-15, and went on to secure fourth place to be named Shield Champs. The rematch against Fullerton will take place at Norco College in a pre-season match on October 26 at 11 a.m. Check

2024 Objective 7.6: Build and support student services to foster student engagement, wellness, and success in the classroom and outside the classroom

- Dr. Tenisha James, dean of Student Services, has been taking the lead on getting the word out to students about EduNav. Student emails, additional guidance in WebAdvisor, and a homepage banner message are all coming soon!
- For this next registration cycle, the District will move forward with redirecting into EduNav only those students with education-plan access in the system (except for Dual

Enrollment/JFK, CRC, and Honors students). This appears to constitute approximately 57% of students districtwide (24,244) over the 345 programs now in the EduNav system. The goal is to merge all students into the EduNav system by spring 2020 for the summer/fall 2020 registration cycle, provided we can get the number of EduNav education-plan-supported students closer to 80%.

- In preparation for winter and spring 2020 registration, on October 18 Dr. James lead training for all Student Services areas, adjunct counselors, and the deans of instruction.

Standard II: Student Learning Programs and Support Services

Standard II is divided into three sections. Major accomplishments and improvements-inprogress that have emerged during the self-evaluation process include the following:

- II.A: Instructional Programs—The College is moving forward in Guided Pathways, having already implemented important and significant changes, such as Schools and onboarding. The College also has been focusing on equity-based pedagogy. The move toward more student-centered scheduling practices will be further supported by the PRT team's upcoming visit.
- II.B: Library and Learning Services—Library and LRC hours have been extended and the Airey Library and LRC have been remodeled as part of data-based program and services enhancements for student support.
- II.C: Student Support Services—Also within a Guided Pathways context, data-based enhancements of student services focus on increasing student access, success, and equity. Student clubs and athletics programs are growing.
- The <u>District Strategic Plan</u> (click to view the plan) was approved by the Board of Trustees at the October 15 meeting.

2024 Objective 8.3: Revise governance process—formalize all unwritten governance processes for more effective implementation of the Educational Master Plan


2030 Goal 10: (Facilities) Build a comprehensive and inspiring campus integrated into the region that serves as a destination for education, commerce, life, and the arts.

On October 17, Norco College and RCCD participated in the <u>Great Shakeout</u> earthquake drill. A
RAVE notification was sent through a text message and Twitter only. (The College did not set off
any alarms or evacuate any of the buildings.) Students, faculty and staff who voluntary chose to
participate were part of the 65,895,671 participants in the Great Shakeout Event.

2024 Objective 10.5: By spring 2021, finish Early Childhood Education Center

• Dr. Wolde-Ab Isaac, chancellor; Dr. Monica Green, interim college president; Dr. Sarah Burnett, professor of early childhood education; and district personnel met with Assembly Member Sabrina Cervantes, who gave the go-ahead to use \$5 million for renovation of Stokoe Center for early childhood education. Stokoe Center for Learning is within Assembly Member Cervantes' service area and within the Norco College service area. This offers an opportunity for the surrounding community with a high need. A formal proposal is being created to be discussed through our college governance process.

2024 Objective 10.10: Design spaces that intentionally build community

• The Student Engagement Centers for the Schools (in ST 107 and ST 108) are scheduled to open by the end of October. Furniture is being delivered October 18, and signage is in the works.

Strategic Direction 1: Student Transformation

2030 Goal 1: (Access) Expand college access by increasing both headcount and full-time equivalent students (FTES).

• The Partnership Resource Team (PRT) will be on campus November 1. Our project seeks guidance and support for organizational and technical changes needed to implement a customized cloud-based scheduling platform for chairs and deans to create detailed class schedules well in advance of the Colleague schedule roll. This will allow the college to build and budget for planned schedules years in advance. This is expected to shorten students' time to completion and reduce total units taken while informing schedulers well in advance of the schedule changes needed to accommodate student demand and facilitate efficient program completion. Right from the beginning of this project, we are including our colleagues at MVC and RCC and District leadership, hoping to pilot phase 1 at Norco College and see it built out in subsequent phases with three additional PRTs next year.

2024 Objective 1.3: Expand enrollment with strategic groups (Dual Enrollment, International, Online, California Rehabilitation Center, Veterans, etc.)

Led by Strategic Development and approved by BFPC, College Police Sgt. Robert Klevano
presented the College's veterans parking space proposal to the District Parking Committee. The
College will be dedicating four existing student parking spots within lots A, B, C, D, and two spots
at STEM, for veterans/scholars. This is a grand total of 18 designated student spots for Norco
College veteran students.

2024 Objective 2.6: Increase percent of students who receive financial aid from 73% to 81%

• The Board of Trustees passed a resolution In Support of Undocumented Student Action Week, Third Week of October at its October 15 meeting. District colleges join community colleges across the state for Undocumented Student Action Week, October 14-18, 2019, and every third week in October thereafter. The formal statement also resolves "that the Riverside Community College District supports efforts by our colleges—Moreno Valley, Norco, and Riverside City—to identify and share best practices for assisting undocumented students . . ." and "that the Riverside Community College District urges Congressional members to uphold California values and create a pathway to citizenship for undocumented students, which will permit them to complete their education goals and achieve their highest potential."
