#### HOW DO I GET STARTED?

- ⇒ Visit the **CAREER CENTER** to learn about opportunities in the field and help determining if it is a good fit for your preferred values, strengths, skills, and interests. CSS 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.
- ⇒ Attend annual **TRANSFER FAIR** and **TRANSFER CENTER WORKSHOPS** to determine which university is the best fit for you as well as application requirements and transfer process.
- ⇒ **JOB SHADOW** and **NETWORK WITH PROFESSIONALS** in positions you wish to obtain.
- ⇒ Participate in campus clubs to gain **TEAMWORK** and **LEADERSHIP SKILLS**.
- ⇒ Practice interpersonal, small group and public speaking COMMUNICATION SKILLS.
- ⇒ Develop aptitudes for analytical thinking, logic, and statistics in order to apply philosophy to a broad range of professions such as law, government, finance, management, and consulting.
- ⇒ Gain experience through VOLUNTEER/INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITIES in education, legal offices, or community outreach programs.
- ⇒ Join **PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION** such as the American Philosophical Association, the American Society for Bioethics and Humanities, or the American Bar Association to maintain current knowledge of opportunities in the field.

#### WHAT SKILLS DO I NEED?

- ⇒ **Reading Comprehension** understanding written sentences and paragraphs in work related documents.
- ⇒ **Active Listening** giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate times.
- ⇒ **Instructing** teaching others how to do something.
- ⇒ **Speaking** talking to others to convey information effectively.
- ⇒ **Critical Thinking** using logic and reasoning to identify the strengths and weaknesses of alternative solutions, conclusions or approaches to problems.

### PREFERRED WORK STYLES INCLUDE:

- ⇒ **Analytical Thinking** analyzing information and using logic to address work-related issues and problems.
- ⇒ Independence developing one's own ways of doing things, guiding oneself with little or no supervision, and depending on oneself to get things done.
- $\Rightarrow$  **Dependability** being reliable, responsible, and dependable, and fulfilling obligations.
- $\Rightarrow$  Integrity being honest and ethical.
- $\Rightarrow$  Achievement/Effort establishing and maintaining personally challenging achievement goals and exerting effort toward mastering tasks.
