#### HOW DO I GET STARTED?

- ⇒ Visit the **CAREER CENTER** to learn about opportunities in the field and help determining if it is a good fit for your preferred values, strengths, skills, and interests. CSS 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.
- ⇒ Attend annual **TRANSFER FAIR** and **TRANSFER CENTER WORKSHOPS** to determine which university is the best fit for you as well as application requirements and transfer process.
- ⇒ JOB SHADOW and NETWORK WITH PROFESSIONALS in positions you wish to obtain.
- ⇒ Participate in campus clubs to gain **TEAMWORK** and **LEADERSHIP SKILLS**.
- ⇒ Practice interpersonal, small group and public speaking **COMMUNICATION SKILLS.**
- ⇒ Learn multiple languages and plan to **STUDY ABROAD** to develop your language skills and international/intercultural competency.
- ⇒ Read foreign newspapers and magazines, watch foreign movies, and listen to foreign broadcasts to maintain your fluency.
- ⇒ **VOLUNTEER** to help with international student campus events and at churches, community organizations, and programs that work with people who speak your target language.
- ⇒ Join **PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION** such as the American Translators Association, the Interpreters Guild of America, or the National Association of Judiciary Interpreters and Translators to network and maintain current knowledge of opportunities in the field.

### WHAT SKILLS DO I NEED?

- ⇒ **Active Listening** giving full attention when others talk, taking time to understand the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting inappropriately.
- $\Rightarrow$  **Speaking** to others to convey information effectively.
- ⇒ **Reading Comprehension** understanding written sentences and paragraphs in work related documents.
- ⇒ Writing communicating effectively in writing as appropriate for the needs of the audience.
- ⇒ **Critical Thinking** using logic and reasoning to identify the strengths and weaknesses of alternative solutions, conclusions or approaches to problems.

### PREFERRED WORK STYLES INCLUDE:

- $\Rightarrow$  **Integrity** being honest and ethical.
- $\Rightarrow$  **Dependability** being reliable, responsible, and dependable, and fulfilling obligations.
- $\Rightarrow$  **Attention to Detail** being careful about detail and thorough in completing work tasks.
- ⇒ **Self Control** maintaining composure, keeping emotions in check, controlling anger, and avoiding aggressive behavior, even in very difficult situations.
- ⇒ Stress Tolerance accepting criticism and dealing calmly and effectively with high stress situations.
