A **CHILD AND ADOLESCENT DEVELOPMENT** degree provides students an understanding of developmentally appropriate practices and anti-bias approaches to teaching, preparing students for careers in K-12, clinical social work, clinical psychology, school psychology, school counseling, college teaching, public policy, and/or developmental research. Students will explore theories and concepts about bio-physical, socio-emotional, and cognitive developmental milestones from conception through adolescence; individual and cultural differences; and common variations in development. Students will develop critical thinking, writing, and oral presentation skills in preparation to work with children and families.

## HOW DO I GET STARTED?

- ⇒ Visit the **Counseling Center** to learn about opportunities in the field and help determining if it is a good fit for your preferred values, strengths, skills, and interests. SSV 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.
- ⇒ Attend annual **TRANSFER FAIR** and **TRANSFER CENTER WORKSHOPS** to determine which university is the best fit for you as well as application requirements and transfer process.
- ⇒ **JOB SHADOW** and **NETWORK WITH PROFESSIONALS** in positions you wish to obtain.
- ⇒ Participate in campus clubs to gain **TEAMWORK** and **LEADERSHIP** skills.
- ⇒ Learn **AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE** and other foreign languages.
- ⇒ Gain experience by **VOLUNTEERING** or getting a **SUMMER JOB** at a camp, daycare centers, or tutoring center.
- ⇒ Obtain **CPR** and **FIRST AID CERTIFICATIONS**.
- ⇒ Join **PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATIONS** such as the National Association for the Education of Young Children or the National Council on Family Relations to network and maintain current knowledge of opportunities in the field.

## WHAT SKILLS DO I NEED?

- ⇒ **Self-reflection** — monitoring/Assessing performance of yourself, other individuals, or organizations to make improvements or take corrective action.
- ⇒ **Service Orientation** — actively looking for ways to help people.
- ⇒ **Social Perceptiveness** — being aware of others' reactions and understanding why they react as they do.
- ⇒ **Active Listening** — giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate times.
- ⇒ **Coordination** — adjusting actions in relation to others' actions.

## PREFERRED WORK STYLES INCLUDE:

- ⇒ **Self Control** — maintain composure, keeping emotions in check, controlling anger, and avoiding aggressive behavior, even in very difficult situations.
- ⇒ **Concern for Others** — being sensitive to others' needs and feelings and being understanding and helpful on the job.
- ⇒ **Integrity** — being honest and ethical.
- ⇒ **Stress Tolerance** — accepting criticism and dealing calmly and effectively with high stress situations.
- ⇒ **Cooperation** — being pleasant with others on the job and displaying a good-natured, cooperative attitude.
