# Regular & Substantive Interactions (RSI)

- Overall, a very thorough, well-organized module that includes the importance of and practical information on how to maintain communication with students throughout the course.

- The organization of the modules is slightly different between the first and subsequent modules. All are well organized; however, the organization of the following modules is preferred over the first.
- Directional/navigation clues at the bottom of the pages are appreciated.

# **Accessibility**

- The information is nicely chunked and paced with clear directions.
- Suggest adding graphics and/or short videos to break up the text.
