- ⇒ Attend annual TRANSFER FAIR and TRANSFER CENTER WORKSHOPS to determine which university is the best fit for you as well as application requirements and transfer process.
- ⇒ JOB SHADOW and NETWORK WITH PROFESSIONALS in positions you wish to obtain.
- ⇒ Participate in campus clubs to gain **TEAMWORK** and **LEADERSHIP** skills.
- ⇒ Gain experience through **VOLUNTEERING.**
- ⇒ Practice interpersonal, small group and public speaking **COMMUNICATION SKILLS.**
- ⇒ Get involved in faculty research to gain **FIELD EXPERIENCE**.
- ⇒ Be willing to travel and endure adverse living/working conditions during field studies or excavations.
- ⇒ Join PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION such as American Anthropology Association or Society of Applied Anthropology, or the National Association for the Practice of Anthropology to network and maintain current knowledge of opportunities in the field.

WHAT SKILLS DO I NEED?

- ⇒ Reading Comprehension understanding written sentences and paragraphs in work related documents.
- ⇒ Writing communicating effectively in writing as appropriate for the needs of the audience.
- ⇒ Active Learning understanding the implications of new information for both current and future problem-solving and decision-making.
- ⇒ Active Listening giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand the points being made, asking questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate times.
- ⇒ Critical Thinking using logic and reasoning to identify the strengths and weaknesses of alternative solutions, conclusions or approaches to problems.
