What is Mentoring?

The objective of mentoring is to develop one-on-one relationships that foster learning, promote self-discovery, and assist in the pursuit of personal and professional goals.

Who is a Mentor?

A mentor is an experienced individual who supports students/mentees through occasional or regular ongoing communication. Mentors may include Norco College peer advisors, alumni, faculty advisors, professionals from the local workforce, and others who can contribute to student development. Each mentor chooses how many students they are available to connect with per month based on their other commitments. Non-employees must secure an endorsement by a current district employee in order to serve as a mentor in the network.

Mentors are positive role models that have achieved personal, academic, and/or professional success through honest hard work and determination. Mentors share information and anecdotes from their own experience in order to provide wisdom and insights that cannot otherwise be obtained through conventional resources (such as books, articles, and classroom instruction).

Common behaviors of mentors include offering motivational support, encouraging professional activities and networking, challenging students to confront and overcome obstacles, and most importantly, setting an inspirational example. The goal of the relationship is to educate students, but also to listen and respond to their questions. Mentors work with students as a coach, teacher, and friend to equip them with the knowledge needed to make important career and life planning decisions.

Mentors also demonstrate sensitivity to the diverse backgrounds of Norco College students, including academic, socioeconomic, cultural, disability, and ethnic differences.

Understanding Boundaries

Mentors are not expected to have answers to every question, nor should they feel obligated to seek out answers or information they do not know first-hand. Rather, mentors should freely refer students to other sources of information whenever appropriate, especially Norco College resources such as the Career Center, Counseling Department, and other college personnel. Mentors may contact college personnel whenever they are unsure of appropriate activities or responses to student inquiries.

Getting Started

Each relationship will begin with an introduction e-mail from a potential student mentee. The student should provide basic information regarding his or her academic and career goals, an explanation of what the student is hoping to learn from the mentor, and contact information.

We ask that mentors try to respond to students within one week. Students will ask a variety of questions related to academic and career experiences, so each mentoring conversation will be different. However, starting with the very first response, it is critical that mentors are clear with their mentees regarding which topics they can provide guidance on and which topics would be better answered through other resources.

Building the Relationship

The network utilizes e-mail communication to initiate the connection between mentor and mentee, but the relationship may proceed with whichever communication method is preferred by both parties.

In most cases, mentors focus their time helping students in five common areas:

1. Enhancing skills and knowledge for a particular industry
2. Supporting academic goals and encouraging completion
3. Building self-confidence for the workplace
4. Establishing a professional network
5. Exploring career interests and assisting with career planning

Guidelines for In-Person Contact

Mentors may also choose to invite students to their work sites or offices for tours or job shadowing activities. Work visits are a great way for mentors to share their work environment and career field with the student. For many students, this may be their first time setting foot in a professional setting. During the work visit, the mentor may invite the student to sit in on meetings and introduce the student to other staff members and colleagues. Mentors and students may also meet up at professional conferences or other career-related activities. (NOTE: Norco College assumes no liability or responsibility for mentoring activities that take place off of the Norco College campus.)

Guidelines for Self-Disclosure

There are two types of disclosure:

Biographical – relates to one's history, past experiences, and present circumstances

Personal – concerns one's more private self, thoughts, and feelings

Biographical information is much easier to disclose, but strong mentoring relationships also balance personal disclosures. Use your judgment to determine what you are comfortable sharing with your mentees.

- Always be honest, genuine, and authentic.
- The more comfortable you are with self-disclosure, the more likely your student will be able to relate to you and actively engage in conversation.
- Try to focus on past experiences the student can relate to.



Moving On

While there is no predefined time period for the duration of Success Network relationships, interactions typically continue until one or both parties feel that the relationship has reached its maximum benefit.

When the time comes, close the relationship in a way that affirms the contributions of both parties. Both the mentor and the student should have an opportunity to assess the experience. In most cases, this will consist of an ending summary e-mail in which either member reviews the topics discussed, reiterates the information that was learned, and ends with a list of next steps or goals for the future.
