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Planning Councils Survey- 2013

Norco College

The manifold purpose of the Planning Councils Survey is to determine the degree of members' satisfaction with the processes involved in committee level planning, program review, resource allocation and decision-making; annually evaluate the criteria used for prioritization; and assess members' perceptions regarding the degree to which the above processes are effective and linked at the planning council level. On November 25, 2013, the Planning Councils Survey was sent out to the co-chairs of the Academic Planning Council (APC), Student Services Planning Council (SSPC), and Business and Facilities Planning Council (BFPC). Twenty-five members from the three councils responded with the following distribution of respondents:

Academic Planning Council (APC)	8
Business & Facilities Planning Council (BFPC)	7

The survey is composed of 10 questions requesting members rate their level of agreement or satisfaction with survey items. The following is a disaggregation by council of responses for each of the items on the survey. Since the number of respondents was relatively low, frequencies will be reported for each council but the overall percentage for the responses on the survey will be presented.

This survey item was one with the highest level of agreement with all but one member indicating Strongly Agree on open dialogue throughout the prioritization process across all three planning councils. The element of dialogue is clearly infused into every step of the prioritization process in each of the planning councils.

Q4: The ranking criteria (rubrics) used for the prioritization process were relevant.

This question on the criteria or rubrics used for prioritization showed a little less agreement than previous questions. However, all of the disagreement came from BFPC members. The survey prompted respondents who disagreed with questions to provide qualitative feedback and this question had two responses as follows:

- The criteria needs to be updated to be linked more clearly to student learning, but also to be inclusive of the types of requests being ranked.
- Recommend the council review and modify the criteria in the spring to make it as relevant as possible to all areas.

The satisfaction level with all of the processes was very high for most council members. Two council members indicated (one each from BFPC and SSPC) dissatisfaction with assessment and

decision making processes. One council member left a comment which clarified that their dissatisfaction was not with assessment, but with the council's lack of use of assessment in their processes.

• The council seldom uses assessment to make decisions. The council also tends to be reactive and seldom engages in conversations that deal with future planning.

Q10: How well linked were the following processes with the activities of this planning council:

With Question 10, there appeared to be more variability in the ratings for linkages between the various processes and the activities of the planning councils. Strategic Planning and Decision-Making Processes were very well linked with the planning councils for the most part. Assessment, Program Review, and Resource Allocation indicated some lacks in linkage (listed from worst to better) as indicated by combined frequencies of Not Well Linked and Somewhat Linked responses.

In summary, the Planning Councils Survey for 2013-14 indicated that planning councils were strong in their use of data, dialogue, perceptions of their role and purpose for resource allocation and strategic planning. Regarding strategic planning, program review, assessment, resource allocation, and decision making, council members were satisfied with these processes, but did not always feel they were strongly linked with council activities. These data will be helpful in evaluating and improving the strategic planning process during the 2014-15 academic year.
